
We are thankful for the tremendous support received from our citizens, City leaders, and the other departments we have worked alongside during the reporting period.

To the Honorable John A. Hull, Mayor of Copperas Cove, members of the City Council, City Manager Andrea Gardner, and to the citizens of Copperas Cove. It is with pleasure to present the Copperas Cove Fire Department's Annual Report for the calendar year 2014. This report will highlight areas such as fire and emergency medical services responses, capital projects, and the fire department budget.

During 2014, Copperas Cove has seen 39% decrease (809 calls) in fire calls, and a 68% increase (3729 calls) in requests for Emergency Medical Services. There was a 57% decrease in the amount of estimated property damage caused by fires. Response times in the city were reduced by 4.16% while response times in the county were reduced by 2.1%.

On behalf of the fire department, I would like to thank our elected officials, city management, the men and women of the department, and the citizens of this community for their continued support of the fire department. Together, we will ensure Copperas Cove will always be safe and will be "The City built for Family Living".



The Administration Division is also charged with the responsibility of ensuring regulatory compliance with the Texas Commission on Fire Protection and the Texas Department of State Health Services














#### TRAINING DIVISION

The Training Division supports the training and education requirements of the fire department employees. Every uniformed member of your fire department holds, at a minimum:

- ·Basic Firefighter (Texas Commission on Fire Protection)
- ·Emergency Medical Technician (Texas Department of State Health Services)

The Texas Department of State Health Services and the Texas Fire Commission offer various levels of advanced certification, as well as require many hours of continuing education to keep the levels of certification currently held.

The Training Division works very diligently to meet the needs of fire department employees and more. It also serves as the logistical and administrative hub for all Emergency Medical Services (EMS) operations. The Training Division works intently to ensure continued smooth operation and outstanding medical care for the citizens of Copperas Cove.

In 2014, the Training Division offered two week long Confined Space Rescue classes to our firefighters and officers.

In 2014 five students graduated from the Central Texas College Paramedic Program. This very intensive one year program is a significant accomplishment and helps add to the response capability that the Copperas Cove Fire Department provides through our EMS Division. In June 2014 three staff members began paramedic school and in August of 2014 three more staff began paramedic school and we anticipate the graduation of Firefighters Hunter Smith, Brad Kammer, Tyler Paulus, Jared Satterfield, Ethan Westbrook and Dylan Karl in the summer of 2015.

The Training Division is looking forward to 2015 as we have two certification classes scheduled to help enhance the knowledge and ability of our firefighters and officers to perform for our citizens. The classes planned for 2015 are:



#### FIRE PREVENTION

The Division of Fire Prevention receives its authority from the adopted 2009 International Fire Code and from City Ordinances, and is responsible for three (3) main support areas of the fire department.

- · Fire Code Development and Enforcement
- · Fire Investigations (Origin and Cause)
- · Public Education and Community Safety



- · Plans review for new construction and alterations/remodeling
- · Inspections of all new buildings
- · Routine inspections of existing buildings
- · Plans review and inspection of fire protection systems
- · Enforcement of applicable codes
- · Development and communications of fire codes.

**Fire Investigations** – Fire Investigators are charged by city charter to investigate the cause of all fires within the city limits of Copperas Cove. If the fire is determined to be intentional (arson) the Fire Investigator(s) will work to identify the suspect(s) and to pursue criminal charges.

**Public Education and Public Safety** – The Division of Fire Prevention (with the assistance of the entire Fire Department) is responsible for spreading the message about fire and life safety throughout the City of Copperas Cove. The division develops and implements programs that teach children and adults about fire and life safety, and emergency prevention. This is accomplished through public appearances, demonstrations, and station tours. Fire Prevention Week is the pinnacle of public education with assemblies in every elementary school. Department personnel also participate in health and safety fairs, career days, witnessed fire drills, and fire extinguisher training for the public.

### Office of Emergency Management

The City of Copperas Cove's Office of Emergency Management is charged with maintaining the City's Comprehensive Emergency Operations Plan. Included in these duties are maintenance of the plan documents, security of the plan, and training on and dissemination of the plan. The City currently has an Advanced Level Plan. This plan was updated in 2011 in accordance with State requirements and approved by the Texas Department of Emergency Management.

The goal of Emergency Management is to provide preparedness, mitigation, response and recovery to our community in the event of disaster. Emergency Management staff conducted a local discussion-based exercise and participated in a regional disaster exercise to test and evaluate various aspects of meeting that goal. The department also participated in regional events through our mutual aid agreements. These included assisting with the wildfires in north Texas and in our surrounding communities.

Additionally, during the year, preparedness information provided by FEMA's *Ready Campaign* and by Texas' *Ready or Not* program was provided to the public on a daily basis using various means of distribution. This information is provided to the public on the City's government access television channel, the City's Facebook page and website, and is available in printed materials that can be picked up at the Copperas Cove Fire Department located at 415 South Main Street.

We will continue to deliver preparedness information and training for the community and staff. To find out what you can do to be prepared or about trainings that might be available to you, visit any of the sources listed above.



#### CAPITAL PROJECTS



Copperas Cove Fire Department purchased a 2014 Spartan Aerial which has a 103' ladder, 1250 gpm pump, and 300 gallon tank. This replaces a 1993 KME Aerial that only had a 75' ladder and 1000 gpm pump. Ladder 1 enhances our ability for above and below grade operations, and provides 100' of horizontal reach. This unit was custom designed to be prepared to respond to the various emergency needs of the citizens with many capabilities.

Also purchased was a 2014 Spartan pumper, with a 1250 gpm pump and 750 gallon tank. This unit replaces a 1997 Pierce pumper, which had reached the end of its service here. The new pumper is custom designed to fit the needs of the growing city.



### **CAPITAL PROJECTS**



A 2015 Chevrolet Tahoe was purchased and retro-fitted as a Command vehicle, replacing a 2004 Ford Expedition. The new Command unit is specifically designed to provide the Incident Commander with an effective workplace to direct operations on emergency scenes.



#### **Community Service**



#### **Citizens Fire Academy**

The Citizens Fire Academy is a public education class offered annually to the public. Each year the class accommodates 15 students as they learn about the services the Copperas Cove Fire Department provides. The goal of the course is to increase fire and life safety awareness, as well as to promote a positive image of the department to the community.


The Academy is an eight week program consisting of classroom and hands-on participation with rescue tools, hose lines, and fire extinguishers. Participants ride-out with firefighters to experience first hand the responsibilities and capabilities of their firefighters in a real world setting. The highlight of the academy is a Saturday "play day" where attendees experience actual firefighting of a car fire while wearing full protective equipment. They also use rescue tools to cut doors and roofs off of cars and perform a search for victims in a smoke-filled environment with a thermal-imaging camera.

#### Mentoring Industrious Minds and Educating Students (M.I.M.E.S.)

Each year the Copperas Cove Fire Department sponsors the M.I.M.E.S. camp which selects 7th grade students from Copperas Cove Junior High School and S.C. Lee Junior High School for a week long glimpse into the fire service.

The students spend five full days at the fire station interacting with firefighters and learning how math and science skills apply in the working world. They are also mentored in leadership roles by serving as a "Company Officer" of the day. Firefighters reinforce character and conduct standards such as honor, integrity, honesty, and professionalism. The students also learn about basic first aid and CPR; city government and how it applies to the structure of the fire service; fire science; math; and many other subjects.

The week ends with the history and traditions of the fire service. Students wear full protective clothing and breathing apparatus to search a smoke filled room, fight a car fire, and extinguish a liquid hydrocarbon fire. It is a very educational and exciting week for both the students and the firefighters that participate!
